

Evie has shown superb **collaboration** with her sister Aela. They have worked together on their learning.






Maisie has shown real **independence** to improve her accuracy with handwriting as well as her times tables and her hard work is really showing great results.
















Year Four Finches

Tai has been learning Brazilian ju-jitsu. He has shown great resilience in learning new skills and persevering with this new challenge.




Olivia has worked hard to make sure her writing is accurate. She has edited her work and worked on drafts to create accurate and wellpresented final versions - like her character profile.

Year Six Blackbirds




Lovely collaboration work from Will with his younger sister, Erin, playing decimal, fraction and percentage dominoes.
