






### **Falcons**

## Learning Music at St Aldhelm's

This year, we have become a Charanga Musical School. We have introduced a new programme, called Charanga, for the delivery of our music curriculum across the whole school, from Reception to Year 6.





Each class explores the aspects of music through listening, appraising, creating, exploring and performing a variety of genres of music.

Charanga is an integrated, practical, exploratory and child-led approach to musical learning.



## 'Once Upon a Dance'




Owls were lucky enough to take part in a Make the Sunshine performance of 'Once Upon a Dance'.





### **Talking Mental Health**



### **Mindfulness**

By teaching children meditation and mindfulness skills we help them increase their well-being and enable them to meet the stresses of the world with presence, self-compassion, and openness. The benefits of mindfulness for children may include:

- 1. Increased focus, attention, self-control, classroom participation, compassion.
- 2. Improved academic performance, ability to resolve conflict, overall well-being.
- 3. Decreased levels of stress, anxiety and disruptive behaviour.

### **Appreciation Practice: Three Good Things**

### Leading the game:

- 1. Ask your child: "Do you ever feel disappointed by something or someone?"
- 2. Ask: "How did that make you feel?"

  Acknowledge their feelings and, if appropriate, talk about them.
- 3. Say something like: "I bet even when you're feeling disappointed there are good things happening in your life, too. Let's name three good things together."

### Tips for naming three good things:

- 1. Remind your child that the point of this game isn't to pretend they're not upset when they feel upset. It's to remember that they can feel two things at once: they can feel grateful for good things while feeling sad, hurt, or disappointed by challenges.
- 2. If children have trouble thinking of three good things on their own, help them discover some through discussion.
- 3. When children understand that this game is not about sweeping their feelings under the rug, the phrase "three good things" can become a playful response to the minor gripes that show up in family life.
- 4. To develop a habit of thankfulness, play *Three Good Things* around the dinner table, before bedtime, and at other times when the family is together.

### A message from our School Governors

I am delighted to have recently been appointed as Local Authority (LA) Governor at St Aldhelm's and I wanted to take a moment to introduce myself.

I applied for the position of Governor after my son started at St Aldhelm's in the Autumn term. I have worked at Mendip District Council in a number of senior management roles for over twenty years, most recently as the Assistant Chief Executive.

I have comprehensive experience in budget management, contract management and operational services as well as Local Authority governance processes and I am excited to offer these skills and hopefully compliment the vast array that the board already possesses.

Recent decisions taken by the board, which were communicated in the last newsletter, will now see St Aldhelm's enter into the process of becoming part of the Bath and Wells Multi Academy Trust (MAT). Whilst the work required to embed this change should not be underestimated, I and my fellow Governors, are willing and keen to support Mrs Cohen and the school as we navigate this change. One which will not only improve the ability to collaborate but will also see our school grow in strength and resilience. Information associated to becoming an Academy is available on the school's website and I would encourage you to have a look and feedback any questions or concerns to Mrs Cohen or the Governing Board.

In addition to supporting this change, I have also been offered the opportunity work more closely with Mrs Philips and Mrs Juden to support the provision of Mathematics as the Maths Link Governor. As with other key subjects, Governors individually support subjects across the curriculum, working on a one-to-one basis with the lead staff member. Mathematics has been without a Link Governor for a short time, whilst Governor recruitment took place, and I am excited to work with Mrs Philips and Mrs Juden to ensure that the governing board is kept appraised of the subject's provision within the school.

After attending my first ever meeting, I am enthused by the welcome and support offered to me and I very much look forward to working with Mrs Cohen, the staff and the board of Governors to ensure the very best for our children and the wider community that the school serves, in what is sure to continue to be challenging yet exciting times.
